Anthrax	Poliomyelitis
Botulism	Rabies in a human or an animal
Diphtheria	Rubella
Glanders	Severe acute respiratory syndrome (SARS)
Hemorrhagic fever, including dengue fever	Smallpox
Influenza, suspected novel strains	Tetanus
Measles	Tularemia
Melioidosis	Yellow fever
Meningococcal invasive disease	An outbreak or unusual number or clustering of diseases
Paralytic shellfish poisoning	or other conditions of public health importance

ROUTINE REPORTING (WITHIN 2 WORKING DAYS)

Acquired immune deficiency syndrome (AIDS)	Malaria
Amnestic shellfish (domoic acid) intoxication	Mumps
Antibiotic-resistant organisms of national significance, including vancomycin-resistant <i>Staphylococcus aureus</i> and carbapenemase-producing Enterobacteriaceae	Pertussis (whooping cough)
Arboviral diseases, including West Nile virus infection	Pregnancy in a person known to be infected with hepatitis B, human immunodeficiency virus (HIV), or syphilis
Brucellosis	Prion diseases, including Creutzfeldt-Jakob disease (CJD)
Campylobacteriosis	Psittacosis
Chancroid	Q fever
<i>Chlamydia trachomatis</i> infection	Rheumatic fever
Ciguatera fish poisoning	Salmonellosis
Cryptosporidiosis	Scombroid fish poisoning
Cyclosporiasis	Shiga-toxin producing <i>Escherichia coli</i> (STEC) infection, including O157:H7
Cysticercosis	Shigellosis
Diphyllobothriasis	<i>Streptococcus agalactiae</i> (Group B streptococcus), invasive disease
Echinococcosis	<i>Streptococcus pneumoniae</i> (pneumococcus), invasive disease
Giardiasis	<i>Streptococcus pyogenes</i> (Group A streptococcus), invasive disease and streptococcal toxic shock syndrome, including necrotizing fasciitis
Gonorrhea	Syphilis
<i>Haemophilus influenzae</i> invasive disease	Trichinosis (trichinellosis)
Hantavirus pulmonary syndrome	Tuberculosis
Hemolytic uremic syndrome (HUS)	Typhoid fever
Hepatitis (type A, B, or C)	Varicella (chickenpox)
Human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) infection	<i>Vibrio</i> infection, including cholera
Influenza death, laboratory-confirmed	Yersiniosis
Legionellosis (Legionnaires' disease or Pontiac fever)
