ADAM'S CAMP ALASKA

ADAM'S CAMP

CAMP TYPE: Day Camp; Therapeutic

CAMP ACTIVITIES: This is a multi-disciplinary therapy camp for children on the autism spectrum. Campers receive six hours of one-on-one therapy per day while being given the opportunity to participate in camp activities. The focus areas are socialization, communication, and helping children develop independence in a camp setting. Older campers participate in outdoor activities and field trips.

This camp emphasizes a healthy lifestyle through physical activity, both indoors and outdoors. This camp exclusively serves campers with disabilities.

WHAT DO YOU WANT PARENTS TO KNOW ABOUT HOW YOUR PROGRAM CAN MEET A CHILD'S SPECIAL NEEDS?

Campers are provided six hours of multi-disciplinary therapy per day. Each family and a member of the therapy team determine the individualized goals for each camper prior to camp starting. The camper benefits from a collaborative approach by the therapy team. At the end of camp, each family has a private conference with the therapy team to discuss their child's goals, progress made on goals, and suggestions to move forward. The camp also includes a sibling program at no additional cost. Siblings have a chance to bond with other siblings dealing with similar family situations. We want the entire family to feel loved and supported.

WHAT DO YOU WANT PARENTS TO KNOW ABOUT HOW YOUR PROGRAM PROMOTES A HEALTHY LIFESTYLE?

There is an emphasis on social skills, communication, and developing self-confidence in a fun, supportive camp setting.

Over the two week period, campers will participate in numerous Unified Sports, which pairs athletes (individuals with intellectual disabilities) and partners (individuals without intellectual disabilities). This provides them the opportunity to be physically active while learning new sports or building upon their skills.
