# Introduction

This publication provides detailed information on the operating grants awarded by the Department of Health and Social Services in Fiscal Year 2019. The department continues to award over 511 grants, to over 204 agencies, totaling over \$153 million. The awarded funds are critical to improving the health, safety, and well-being of our citizens, many of whom are our most vulnerable.

Included in this publication are grants for a Crisis Stabilization Center and a Medically-Monitored Withdrawal Management (“Detoxification”) program under the Department of Behavioral Health. These programs are part of the State’s response to expand substance use disorder (SUD) services in order to address the rising incidence of opioid abuse in Alaska.

Details provided for each grant program include a brief narrative, Results Based Budgeting Framework, grantee name, service area, fund source and award amount. Included in this publication, is a DHSS Services Regions map providing a graphic description of the regions adopted by the department, which helps assess distribution of services and resources across the state. Lastly, an Election District report is included to delineate grant services provided in each election district.

Grant programs are managed collaboratively with each of the department’s divisions and Finance Management Services, Grants Section. We welcome your suggestions regarding the Department’s response to the needs of Alaskans and how we can improve our services through our grant programs.

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## Behavioral Health

### Adult Rural Peer Support

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.30.520-620 The Community Mental Health Services Act; and AS 47.376, Uniform Alcoholism and Treatment Act

**Description of Services:** Support existing organizations seeking to expand into rural areas, or to allow for community mental health centers in rural areas to add peer support to their existing service delivery system, or maintain peer support organizations developed through the Beneficiary Project Initiative. The intent is to promote growth and institutionalization of peer support in behavioral health systems outside Anchorage, Juneau, and Fairbanks areas. The Division anticipates the following outcomes: increased number of peer support organizations actively serving members/individuals in rural communities and improved client quality of life outcomes for individuals engaged in peer support services.

**Assessment of Need:** Peer support is a recognized best practice in behavioral health. Individuals who have completed treatment or are successfully managing their recovery are often very successful in engaging and supporting their peers in the recovery process. Having trained peer support workers in rural areas would help alleviate the workforce issues faced by rural areas in the recruitment and retention of qualified behavioral health staff from other areas. These positions would also provide local, meaningful employment for peers, an important component of recovery.

**Service Delivery Area:** Statewide other than Anchorage, Juneau and Fairbanks.

## Behavioral Health

### Alcohol Safety Action Program (Adult and Juvenile)

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs,

AS 47.31 Uniform Alcoholism and Intoxication Treatment Act

**Description of Services:** The Alcohol Safety Action Program (ASAP) services are intended for adult and juvenile clients who have a current or pending misdemeanor criminal case with the Alaska Court System (ACS) for driving while intoxicated and/or other alcohol and drug related misdemeanor cases. Services provide case management and accountability to clients by: 1) screening criminal cases referred from the district court into drinker classification categories and; 2) managing misdemeanor alcohol offender cases to ensure their required substance abuse education or treatment program are completed, as prescribed by the courts.

**Assessment of Need:** The ASAP program is an integral part of the ACS and the Behavioral Health continuum of care, providing invaluable and necessary substance abuse services in all major communities throughout Alaska. Maintaining our current ASAP system of service in our major Alaskan communities is vital to our goal of reducing alcohol use, abuse and dependency across our state.

**Service Delivery Area:** Service areas include: Juneau, Ketchikan, Kodiak, Fairbanks, Dillingham, Copper River, Bethel, Palmer/Wasilla, Anchorage, Kenai/Homer, Seward, Nome, Kotzebue, and Barrow.

### Behavioral Health Provider Association

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs,

AS 47.30.520-620 Community Mental Health Services Act

**Description of Services:** This grant program is designed to assist grantees/providers in improving their business and clinical management practices. Information will be provided in the following areas:

1. The development and implementation of programs that promote clinically integrated services to those individuals experiencing a co-occurring mental health and substance abuse disorder.
2. The development and implementation of practices that create administrative efficiencies.
3. The development and implementation of practices that improve quality management programs with agencies.

**Assessment of Need:** The Community Mental Health Services Act provides for a single funding mechanism to develop and maintain mental health services throughout the state. The system has approximately 35,000 individuals utilizing crisis services. The services are targeted to adults with serious mental illness and seriously emotionally disturbed youth.

**Service Delivery Area:** Services are rendered statewide to all non-state mental health providers, mental health grantees, as well as the State of Alaska.

## Behavioral Health

### Bethel Community Service Patrol and Sobering Center

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 18.08.010, AS 44.29.150, AS 47.30.477, AS 47.30.520 - 620, AS 47.37, and 7 AAC 71.010 - 71.300 Community Mental Health Services, and 7 AAC 29 State Standards for Alcoholism Programs.

**Description of Services:** Bethel's Community Service Patrol (CSP) will patrol the town, picking up inebriated individuals and deliver them to the appropriate facility for assessment. If needed, CSP will transport them to the Yukon Kuskokwim Health Corporation (YKHC) Sobering Center where they can sober up in an environment that provides monitoring and protection. Individuals taken to the YKHC Sobering Center will also be screened and receive case management services that connect them to services, such as referrals for Substance Abuse or Mental Health assessments and treatment.

**Assessment of Need:** The Bethel region has been identified by the Alaska Mental Health Trust Authority (AMHTA) as a target area for specialized chronic inebriate services due to the large number of Title 47 protective holds that result in people being taken to local correctional facilities or hospital emergency rooms. Neither of these facilities have the capacity to provide services for those needing care. The CSP is an integral part of a multi-faceted service system designed to provide protection, identification, and referral for treatment for the targeted population. The YKHC Sobering Center provides a more appropriate and preferable setting, than the local correctional facility or emergency room.

**Service Delivery Area:** Bethel Service Area. Available data documenting incarcerations associated with protective custody holds demonstrates that the City of Bethel has one of the highest incidences of protective holds in the State. Because of this, the AMHTA and DBH have identified the region as a priority for additional program efforts.

### Bring the Kids Home

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.30.520 – 620 Community Mental Health Services Act; AS 47.30.655 - .915 Alaska Civil Commitment Statutes; AS 47.37 Uniform Alcoholism & Intoxication Treatment Act

**Description of Services:** Bring the Kids Home (BTKH) serves a high-risk population of Seriously Emotionally Disturbed Youth (SEDY) and their families. The goal, when appropriate, is for the division to provide funding until an agency is self-sufficient. Service strategies and models will vary as needed to keep children from out-of-state placements and/or to maintain children in their communities or homes.

**Assessment of Need:** This program continues the success of keeping children from being placed in out-of-state residential psychiatric treatment centers (RPTC) or outside of their communities and homes.

**Service Delivery Area:** Statewide.

### Chemical Dependency Professionals Certification

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.37 - Uniform Alcoholism and Intoxication Treatment Act

**Description of Services:** This program provides funds to the Alaska Commission for Behavioral Health Certification (ACBHC) to process certification and re-certification applications. This agency provides vital communications between the voluntary Commission members and those they represent in the field. The agency also receives and processes ethical conduct or scope-of-practice related complaints made on applicants and certificate holders. Standards are set by the National Association of Addiction Professionals for the certification of behavioral health associates, chemical dependency counselors, administrators, and training.

**Assessment of Need:** The program provides various levels of certification. Staff verify, review, and approve/reject applications concerning experience, practicum hours, education, training hours completed, character reference, adherence to ethical practice, and criminal background disclosure, assuring a minimum level of consistent competence to clients.

## Behavioral Health

### Comprehensive Behavioral Health Prevention and Early Intervention Services

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.37.030 Uniform Alcoholism and Intoxication Treatment Act and AS 47.30.470-500 Alcoholism and Drug Abuse.

**Description of Services:** Assist and support efforts to reduce and prevent substance use and abuse, suicide, and self- destructive behavior; strategies will be comprehensive, integrated prevention and early prevention approaches. Overall, the goal of these grant funds is to "promote healthy communities utilizing effective practices and partnerships" to reduce risk factors and the harmful consequences of substance and poor mental health, and to promote protective factors to empower local communities to create population-level change in behavioral health conditions.

**Assessment of Need:** Through the integrated services of Behavioral Health, we are now able to address a broader view of substance use problems to look more holistically at those individuals who are also impacted by mental illness, depression, interpersonal violence trauma and other behavioral health concerns. A comprehensive, multi-disciplinary review of all substances in Alaska and the consequences of those substances on Alaskan citizens and communities has been conducted and will inform and guide strategies to be identified in this program's Request for Proposals and Non-Competitive Request for Proposals.

### First Episode Psychosis

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.30.520-.620, AS 47.30.655-.915 and AS 47.30.011-.061

**Description of Services:** The First Episode Psychosis (FEP) program is an evidence-based practice to identify and serve individuals in their teen years or during early adulthood who have had or are at risk of having their first episode of a psychotic disorder. Research has demonstrated that early, appropriate treatments and supports can help to prevent the full onset of illness for persons in a high-risk state, and improve long-term outcomes for those who have already had a first episode of psychosis. Services are a team based, multi-modality approach to treating FEP. Component interventions include community outreach, assertive case management, individual or group psychotherapy, supported employment and education services, family education and support, and low doses of select antipsychotic agents.

**Assessment of Need:** National research has demonstrated that approximately 100,000 adolescents and young adults experience FEP each year.

**Service Delivery Area:** Resources will be allocated to a single service area with a population sufficiently large enough to support the program (approx. 100,000).

### Medication Assisted Treatment Expansion Grant

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.30.520-.620, AS 47.30.655-.915 and AS 47.30.011-.061

**Description of Services:** The purpose of this program is to expand/enhance access to medication-assisted treatment (MAT) services for persons with opioid use disorder seeking or receiving MAT. This program targets states identified with having the highest rates of primary treatment admissions for heroin and opioids per capita, and prioritizes those states with the most dramatic increases for heroin and opioids, based on Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration's (SAMHSA) Treatment Episode Data Set (TEDS): 2007 - 2013.

MAT is to be provided in combination with comprehensive substance use disorder treatment, including but not limited to: counseling, behavioral therapies, and, when needed, pharmacotherapy for co-occurring alcohol use disorder. MAT is to be provided in a clinically driven, person-centered, and individualized setting.

**Assessment of Need:** Alaska has been identified as a state with a significant increase in opioid use and deaths. In 2008, Alaska had one of the highest drug overdose death rates in the nation, 14.9-27.0 per 100,000 people. Prescription drug abuse is the nation's fastest growing drug problem. Opioid pain relievers, such as oxycodone and hydrocodone, are the most widely misused. In 2012, healthcare providers across the nation wrote 259 million prescriptions for painkillers, enough for every American adult to have a bottle of pills. Alaska has shared in this growing problem.

**Service Delivery Area:** Anchorage, Fairbanks, Juneau and Mat-Su Valley.

### Permanent Supportive Housing

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.30.520-620 Community Mental Health Services Act, AS 47.376 Uniform Alcoholism and Intoxication Treatment Act, AS 47.30.655-915 Alaska Civil Commitment Statutes, and AS 47.30.011-061 Alaska Mental Health Trust Authority.

**Description of Services:** Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) is a specific Evidence-Based Practice characterized by availability of comprehensive support services in integrated community settings (coupled with affordable rent) and is a crucial resource for many people with a behavioral health diagnosis that has interfered with successful housing tenancy. Housing with supports provides a stable base for recovery, which can be difficult for individuals who are experiencing homelessness, living in unnecessary restricted/segregated settings, and re-entering the community from institutional settings. The comprehensive array of active treatment services purchased through this grant program include, but is not limited to, some of the following services: assertive outreach and engagement to bring individuals into services; linkage to affordable housing and housing stability services; employment support services/job skills training; substance abuse treatment and coordination; mental health treatment and coordination; referral to primary care services; activities of daily living services and training; medication management and monitoring; detoxification services; relapse prevention and recovery planning; and illness management and recovery.

The Division of Behavioral Health, through a thoughtful process, created a multi-component PSH competitive solicitation (in October 2014) with capital funding in order to meet the varying intensity of needs of the chronically homeless subpopulations (including the chronic inebriate subpopulation) and build Anchorage's capacity to provide integrated community-based services. This process was collaborative and included input from the Alaska Mental Health Trust, the Alaska Housing Finance Corporation, the Department of Corrections, and the Municipality of Anchorage Department of Health and Human Services. The competitive solicitation separated the PSH program into two categories, Intensive Case Management (ICM) and Assertive Community Treatment (ACT), to meet the needs of chronically homeless subpopulations. In order to blend and braid funding, projects awarded under the ACT component were eligible to apply for a non-competitive solicitation in the amount of \$2,215,000 in order to have a fully funded project. There are no other Divisions that are currently funding Intensive Case Management or Assertive Community Treatment.

**Assessment of Need:** Individuals with physical or mental illness and substance use are highly represented in the chronically homeless population. Social service costs per homeless individual annually (including shelter, medical costs, and incarceration) are estimated at \$42,000-\$60,000. For highly vulnerable Seriously Mentally Ill (SMI) individuals, FY13 data shows that there were 70 non-waiver SMI recipients in the Anchorage area with Medicaid costs already totaling over \$25,000/ recipient, all with mood (e.g., bi-polar) or schizophrenic disorders, many with previous annual average Medicaid payment of \$89,880/ recipient (which does not count the high cost of police interactions, emergency room visits, Alaska Psychiatric Institute (API) hospitalizations, or Department of Corrections (DOC) days).

The program was developed in response to the critical need for a stable system of behavioral health providers in rural Alaska by hiring, training, supporting, and supervising culturally competent village-based counselors and counselors that serve relocated villagers. This program provides the opportunity for rural people to achieve their goal of helping their own people. Training is provided through the Rural Human Services Training Program in the University of Alaska College of Rural Alaska from one of its designated Rural Human Services campuses and supports a range of degree programs from a two-year certificate to Masters Degree of Social Work.

**Assessment of Need:** This program seeks to address the problem of scarcity of counseling and crisis intervention resources in the villages of rural Alaska and to reduce the costly reliance on itinerant service providers and employees who come from outside of a community, only to stay a year or less. The goal of the project is to ensure there is "a counselor in every village" as well as secondary behavioral health specialists where needed to provide continuity of care and consistency in community-level services.

**Service Delivery Area:** Eligible applicants include rural substance abuse programs, community mental health centers, and other human services agencies, and to urban agencies serving people who have relocated from rural areas.

### Sobering Center, Withdrawal Management and Residential SUD Treatment Services

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs,

AS 47.30.520-620 Community Mental Health Services Act; 7AAC 70 Behavioral Health Services; 7AAC 135 Medicaid Coverage for Behavioral Health Services; and AS 47.37 Uniform Alcoholism and Intoxication Treatment Act.

**Description of Services:** Under the Sobering Center, Withdrawal Management and Residential Substance Use Disorder (SUD) Treatment Services program, applicants must address one of three services in their proposal:

- 1) Sobering Center Services– Sobering centers are a safe, supportive, environment for publicly intoxicated individuals to become sober. These are staffed 24 hours a day, 7 days/week.
- 2) Residential Withdrawal Management (Detoxification) Services– Residential withdrawal management programs provide detoxification facilities to adult patients who, due to their misuse of alcohol and/or other drugs including opioids, are frequent users of emergency medical services, public safety services, the emergency rooms of acute care hospitals, or Alaska Psychiatric Institute (API).
- 3) Residential Substance Use Disorder Treatment Services– Residential SUD treatment programs serve individuals with dependence on alcohol or other drugs, who need 24 hour services and supports. These programs must be Level 3.5 Clinically Managed High-Intensity Residential Services 7 AAC 70.120 (a-e; h) which requires 20 or more hours of clinical and rehabilitation services weekly.
- 4) Crisis Stabilization Center- Medically staffed and psychiatrically supervised SUD/ Co-Occurring Serious Mental Illness (SMI) facility that would function as an alternative to an emergency room visit for those individuals experiencing a temporary or situational behavioral health crisis. The average length of stay would range from 24 to 72 hours, although in certain cases individuals could be retained for up to 5 days
- 5) Ambulatory Withdrawal Management (AWM) without Extended On-Site Monitoring- This is an organized outpatient service which may be delivered in an office setting, health care or addiction treatment facility, or in a patient's home by trained clinicians. They will provide medically supervised evaluation, withdrawal management and referral services according to a predetermined schedule, for individuals who do not require inpatient withdrawal management services.
- 6) Housing Services- Inclusive of all short term housing services that are focused on supporting individuals through transitions of care from an acute/subacute setting, residential program, correctional facility and/or for individuals who are making efforts to maintain their recovery and are in need of a short term stable living environment. Housing services can include vouchers, rental support or service supports for those placed in housing who would potentially otherwise not succeed in housing placements.

**Assessment of Need:** There is a substantial unmet need for Sobering centers, leading to nearly 4000 protective custody incarceration events annually. Currently, Withdrawal Management (detoxification) services are limited to Fairbanks (16 beds) and Anchorage (14 beds). In FY15, only 840 Alaskans received Residential SUD Treatment as there is a lack of ready access to any of these three services.

**Service Delivery Area:** Statewide. Geographic considerations can be made in the selection of the grantees based on statewide assessment of need. A minimum of two projects will be funded, each up to a maximum of \$1,000,000 per year for 3 years.

Amended to fund additional Residential Withdrawal Management services, Residential SUD Treatment services, a Crisis Stabilization Center, Ambulatory Withdrawal Management services, and/or Housing Services beginning in FY19.

### State Targeted Response Opioid Treatment

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.30.520 - .620, AS 47.30.655 - .915 and 47.30.011 - .061

**Description of Services:** The purpose of the Alaska State Targeted Response (STR) to the opioid crisis grant is to increase access to treatment, reduce unmet treatment needs, and reduce opioid overdose related deaths through prevention, treatment, and recovery activities for Opioid Use Disorders (OUD). Specifically, Alaska will focus on the following three goals: 1) increase provider capacity in the state for Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT), 2) increase the number of clients receiving appropriate OUD/MAT treatment, and 3) decrease the negative impacts of opioid use. MAT is to be provided through an office based opioid treatment program in combination with comprehensive substance use disorder treatment, including but not limited to: counseling, behavioral therapies, and when needed, pharmacotherapy for co-occurring alcohol use disorder. MAT is to be provided in a clinically driven, person-centered, and individualized setting.

**Assessment of Need:** Alaska has been identified as a state with a significant increase in opioid use and deaths. In 2008, Alaska had one of the highest drug overdose death rates in the nation, 14.9 - 27.0 per 100,000 people. Prescription drug abuse is the nation's fastest growing drug problem. Opioid pain relievers, such as oxycodone and hydrocodone, are the most widely misused. In 2012, healthcare providers across the nation wrote 259 million prescriptions for painkillers; enough for every American to have a bottle of pills. Alaska has shared in this growing problem.

**Service Delivery Area:** Fairbanks, Kenai, Southeast, Anchorage and Mat-Su Borough.

### Strategic Prevention Framework Partnerships for Success

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.37.030, AS 47.30.470

**Description of Services:** The Strategic Prevention Framework Partnerships for Success Grant (SPF-PFS) will build a solid foundation for delivering and sustaining effective substance abuse prevention services in Alaska. It will implement the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration's (SAMHSA) Strategic Prevention Framework (SPF) with the following goals:

- Enhance the state's established prevention system and infrastructure to prevent the onset and reduce the progression of the substance abuse priority areas across the state of Alaska
- Support and increase the infrastructure of high need communities' capacity to implement, sustain, and improve effective substance abuse prevention efforts at the local level
- Support and enhance the continuum of prevention services through data-driven practices in Alaska

The SPF is a data-driven planning model that will assist both the state and, in turn, community grantees to assess substance use data and capacity; develop a strategic plan to address those substance use issues; explore the consumption patterns, consequences, and related risk and protective factors contributing to the substance use/abuse; and implement evidence-based strategies to address the issues. This program will focus on data collection and assessment; coalition building; developing community and regional prevention capacity and infrastructure; monitoring and evaluation; and sustainability at the community and state levels beyond the federal grant.

**Assessment of Need:** Prescription drug misuse and abuse has increased and expanded across Alaska. Those unable to obtain prescription opioids may turn instead to heroin. Heroin is less expensive than purchasing pills illegally, and in some parts of the state heroin is much more accessible. The state will use data from the National Survey on Drug Use and Health and Youth Risk Behavior Survey, in addition to pertinent data on related consequences, to frame the SPF-PFS strategic plan.

### Substance Use Disorder Services for OCS Engaged Families

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.30.520 -620 Community Mental Health Services Act; AS 47.37 Uniform Alcoholism and Intoxication Treatment Act

**Description of Services:** The Division of Behavioral Health (DBH) provides Assessment, Case Management, and Recovery Services to referrals from the Office of Children's Services (OCS) in Anchorage and the Matanuska-Susitna Borough. This ensures quick access and linkage to screening, assessment and admission to substance use and co-occurring disorder treatment for parents and families whose substance abuse is a contributing factor to a substantiated report of harm and/or to their children being in OCS custody.

**Assessment of Need:** Parents and families of children in OCS custody often have significant substance abuse histories with little access to intervention services. Most clients require access to residential and/or outpatient substance use or co-occurring disorders treatment in order to stabilize such that parents and families can retain or regain custody of their children.

**Service Delivery Area:** Services will be provided in Anchorage and the Matanuska-Susitna Borough. These service areas are OCS-designated performance improvement sites.

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.30.520-620 Community Mental Health Services Act

**Description of Services:** This is an evidence-based program funded under the federal Community Mental Health Centers block grant. Services provided promote self-sufficiency among adults experiencing severe mental illness (SMI) and/or a co-occurring disorder related to substance abuse. Supported Employment is characterized by rapid placement into integrated employment settings of an individual's choosing and capabilities, with commensurate wages and long term supports as needed and wanted by an individual.

**Assessment of Need:** Supported employment is an evidence-based best practice with robust research demonstrating a correlation between employment and recovery from the most serious mental illnesses. Through this program, employment services have been developed to increase the number of clients engaging in supportive employment activities. It helps them attain independence, improve their quality of life, and attain employment that is beneficial to themselves, their families, and the community.

### Therapeutic Court

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.520-620 Community Mental Health Services Act; AS 47.37 Uniform Alcoholism and Intoxication Treatment Act.

**Description of Services:** Under the Therapeutic Court Program, agencies provide a range of services integrating behavioral treatment, sanctions, and incentives with case processing. The focus is on a high-risk population of chronically dependent clients and/or individuals with a co-occurring mental health disorder.

**Assessment of Need:** Therapeutic courts seek to solve underlying problems that generate repeated encounters with the criminal justice and behavioral health system. In a 2007 report, Criminal Recidivism in Alaska, the Alaska Judicial Council found that graduates of three different therapeutic courts were rearrested and re-convicted far less frequently than comparison offenders. In the study, the Council followed graduates for one year after they completed their program and a comparison group of offenders for one year after they were released from serving their sentence.

### Trauma Informed Training for Behavioral Health Providers

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.30 - AS 47.31

**Description of Services:** This component will implement a specialized trauma-informed curriculum (TIC) to assure that the community-based behavioral health providers integrate an understanding of trauma into their programs and therapeutic approaches. The successful applicant will implement a training, mentoring and on-going coaching model that helps embed newly learned skills into the "trainee agency" and support them through their transition.

**Assessment of Need:** Trauma is recognized as a significant factor in a wide range of health, behavioral health and social problems including heart disease, cancer, chronic lung disease, mental health and substance use disorders, violence victimization and perpetration, self-injury, homelessness, prostitution, delinquency and criminal behavior. Treating the individual to address these adverse events can reverse negative implications for them as they grow and learn. Failure to do so can be dangerous. This program will provide technical assistance and training to administrative staff regarding leadership elements of coordinating TIC services across community settings with multiple providers. Develop and facilitate an annual two-day training conference that coordinates with the Alaska Behavioral Health Association (ABHA) and provides funding for a minimum of one nationally known speaker on current policy issues, determined in concert with ABHA.

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs

**Description of Services:** Community Initiative Matching Grants (CIMG) provide essential human services in close alignment with those of the Human Services Community Matching Grants (HSCMG). CIMG favors very basic essential human services: homeless shelters; soup kitchens and food banks; non-residential emergency shelters; outreach to homeless/homeless find; distribution centers for essential items such as sleeping bags and cold weather gear; and transportation vouchers/services supporting access to basic essential services and medical providers.

**Assessment of Need:** Program services are essential, mirroring the HSCMG definition in AS 29.60.650(1): lack of availability would subject persons needing the services to serious mental or physical hardship. The target population consists of families and individuals in need.

**Service Delivery Area:** Statewide, excluding those areas statutorily eligible for HSCMG: Municipality of Anchorage, and the Fairbanks North Star and Matanuska-Susitna Boroughs.

**Description of Services:** The Human Services Community Matching Grants, in accordance with AS 29.60.600, provide for essential human services. Essential human services are those defined as "social services" in AS 47.75.060, except that they include only services whose unavailability would subject persons needing the services to serious mental or physical hardship.

**Assessment of Need:** Per AS 29.60.600 each eligible political subdivision of the state will carry out a needs assessment to prioritize the proposed services and will consult with a citizens' advisory group in consideration of services to be obtained under subawards. Applicants are required to demonstrate that services provided under subawards are essential as statutorily defined.

**Service Delivery Area:** AS 29.60.650 restricts eligibility to cities with populations greater than 20,000; unified municipalities with populations greater than 100,000; and second class boroughs with populations greater than 65,000. Population is determined by the Department of Commerce, Community, & Economic Development (DCCED). The Municipality of Anchorage, and the Matanuska-Susitna and Fairbanks North Star Boroughs are currently eligible.

## Juvenile Justice

### Federal Formula Non-Secure Attendant Care Shelter

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, 7 AAC 81 - Grant Services to Individuals, AS 47.05.010(7), AS 47.14.010(6)

**Description of Services:** Non-secure attendant care shelters provide short-term staff-secure placement for referred youth and youth placed into protective custody until they can be safely released to a parent/guardian or transferred to a residential or juvenile detention facility. Referrals are made by the Division of Juvenile Justice's (DJJ) juvenile probation officers, by local judicial and law enforcement officers, as well as by schools. Shelter attendants provide one-to-one, same gender supervision to referred youth in staff-secure settings. Shelter service is available 24 hours per day and is provided within 45 minutes of notification of need. Shelter placements may not exceed 16 hours unless an extension is authorized.

**Assessment of Need:** The Federal Formula Grant Program makes funds available to states to improve juvenile justice systems and implement delinquency prevention and intervention strategies as mandated in the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act. In FY89, DJJ began using a portion of its Formula grant to support a statewide network of non-secure shelters. A strong and viable statewide system of non-secure shelters has been instrumental in reducing violations of the first three core mandates by providing temporary placement for youth placed in protective custody.

**Service Delivery Area:** Current utilization rates, DJJ juvenile delinquency data, and feedback gathered from DJJ field staff and community providers indicate the need for continued operation of the five existing non-secure shelters.

## Juvenile Justice

### Formula Title II Grant Program

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.14.010(6) General Powers of Department over Juvenile Institutions; AS 47.05.010(7) Duties of Department

**Description of Services:** The Division of Juvenile Justice (DJJ) has traditionally given Formula Title II funds directly to communities, with a focus on rural Native Alaskan communities. The program focus is a reduction of Native Alaskan youth in the DJJ system as well as delinquency prevention programming in keeping with the four core mandates of the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP). Program services include pass through grant programs to Alaska Native communities that support the reduction of Alaska Native youth in the juvenile justice system, and providing assistance to such communities in the areas of post-award program development, grant management and reporting.

**Assessment of Need:** As well as the disproportionate number of Alaska Native youth referred to the juvenile justice system, the recidivism rate for these youth is also higher than compared to other youth. The re-offense rate for Alaska Native youth released from formal probation supervision has been relatively constant from FY10-FY14, ranging from 44% - 54% compared with 35% - 43% for Caucasian youth. The re-offense rate for Alaska Native youth released from secure DJJ treatment over the last five years has ranged from 67% - 77%, holding at 73% for the last two years. This compares with 43% - 60% for Caucasian youth released from institutional treatment.

**Service Delivery Area:** These funds will be used statewide for distribution to rural Native Alaskan communities.

## Juvenile Justice

### Youth Courts/Community Panels

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.14.010(6) and (7); AS 04.16.050(b)(1) and AS 47.12.400

**Description of Services:** Program services include case screening, adjudication, disposition, and case management for youth who are referred for non-violent first or second time misdemeanor offenses, and/or status offenses. Cases are tried with representation and adjudication by the defendant's peers. Referral sources are DJJ field offices, local school districts, and District Courts.

**Assessment of Need:** The program's early intervention and diversion services supplement and broaden the range of accountability-based restorative justice services for youth. Benefiting victims and communities, program services allow for the swift application of graduated responses, proven to be effective in preventing, controlling, and reducing further delinquent behaviors.

**Service Delivery Area:** Statewide. Resources will be allocated based on demonstrated need for services as supported by available data.

## Office of Children's Services

### Children's Advocacy Centers

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs

**Description of Services:** Children's Advocacy Centers (CACs) help to identify maltreated children and protect them from further harm; provide referrals to treatment and follow up; hold offenders accountable; and provide community outreach and education regarding child abuse. A comprehensive, child-centered response in suspected cases of child abuse includes the coordinated efforts of a multidisciplinary team (MDT) including law enforcement, district attorneys and the assistant attorney general's office, child protection, victim advocates, mental and medical health professionals.

**Assessment of Need:** Centers accept referrals of suspected sexual abuse and other severe abuse of children up to age 18. Most also accept referrals of developmentally disabled young adults and those with cognitive impairments such as Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder.

Referrals continue to increase due to the State's broad support for effective CACs and increased community awareness regarding child abuse and child sexual abuse. Current centers are stable but not self-sustaining. Emerging projects will build capacity by expanding the number of locales served and increasing the number of children receiving services in or near their home communities. This will also offer some cost savings to CACs currently serving children from outside the center's locale.

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## Office of Children's Services

### Circles of Support

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs

**Description of Services:** Under this program, grantees will provide family services for two categories of clients based upon the level of risk. Category 1 clients are families whose children are currently safe but at a high risk of future maltreatment. For these clients, Office of Children's Services (OCS) will close their case and turn over case management to the grantee who will be responsible for providing in-home services which may include substance abuse assessment, urinalysis testing, support for the parents to eliminate any health or safety hazards in the child's physical surroundings, assistance with seeking a protective order if domestic violence is a factor, mental health evaluation or stabilization as well as close supervision and frequent monitoring. Category 2 clients are families whose children are currently unsafe and OCS will retain responsibility of the case but work with grantee's to coordinate services that often involve intensive intervention, involuntary service provision, and court involvement.

**Assessment of Need:** Federal requirements outline that the caseworkers need to visit homes on a frequent basis to reassess the safety of the child at every contact, work with providers and ensure the children's needs are also being met while the parent is addressing their identified areas of need. The program meets Department needs for training and support of a continuous pool of safe, trained and culturally appropriate families with which to place children. The program provides, to foster parents in every Resource Family home, accessibility to training to meet minimum annual requirements established by 7 AAC 50.250(g).

At the end of State Fiscal Year 2016, there were 3015 children in out-of-home placement. During the same time frame there were 1792 licensed foster homes. Due to the increasing number of children in out-of-home placement, the Department anticipates an increased need for new Resource Families as well as for training and support for existing Resource Families.

We are seeking grantees with a demonstrated understanding of the ICWA, and an existing infrastructure in remote/local settings to provide culturally relevant intensive case management services.

Families who have adopted children from OCS have special parenting needs due to their children's trauma histories. Children adopted from foster care often have experiences of abandonment, physical maltreatment, neglect and grief over the loss of their birth families. Many children who have been adopted have a significant level of special needs, for which adoptive and guardianship families need support. Families often need services which are sensitive to the adoption and guardianship issues families face. Families who have adopted children from other states as well as privately through domestic or international adoption agencies, may also face special challenges. The program meets Department needs for post-adoption support.

Based on data in the Online Resources for Children of Alaska (ORCA) database, at the end of State Fiscal Year 2016, there were 3330 children in Alaska's subsidized adoption and guardianship program. In FY16, OCS finalized a total of 273 adoptions and legal guardianships for children in foster care.

A needs assessment identified the need for local programming. OCS determined that the most effective use of funds and personnel to reach the most individuals in the shortest time, and with efficacy, was to fund one of the many existing statewide agencies who already administer similar programs to sub-award and coordinate services in rural areas, combining the funding of both a prevention network, and parenting education in one grant.

**Description of Services:** Child Care Licensing Program services include: processing applications; determining provider eligibility; obtaining valid criminal history and child protection check results on providers; announced and unannounced visits to child care facilities for initial, annual and renewal inspections; investigation procedures for licensed and approved providers in the Municipality of Anchorage (MOA), and all administrative hearing practices for the providers in the MOA.

The department retains overall responsibility for the management of child care licensing efforts in the state. This involves promulgating rules and regulations governing the program, overseeing the expenditure of funds by the grantee, monitoring services, and ensuring the grantee operates within their scope of work. The Municipality of Anchorage promulgates municipal child care codes that, at a minimum, must meet state regulations.

**Assessment of Need:** The intent of the Child Care Licensing Program is to reduce the risk of predictable harm to children and support services to child care providers. In accordance with AS 47.32.030, the department may delegate its powers relating to licensure of child care facilities to a municipality that has adopted an ordinance providing for child care licensing under the home rule powers under AS 29.10.010 or as authorized under AS 29.35.200-29.35.210. These powers have been delegated to the Municipality of Anchorage since 1998.

**Service Delivery Area:** The Municipality of Anchorage (MOA) is the only entity that qualifies under the provisions of AS 47.32.030.

Collaborating with early childhood partners and the public in advancing child care goals Supporting the early care and learning system by strengthening collaborations, managing Learn & Grow, Alaska's Quality Recognition and Improvement System, and Alaska's System for Early Education and Development (SEED).

**Assessment of Need:** The Department of Health and Social Services receives federal Child Care and Development Funds (CCDF). CCR&R is engaged in: Referral services to families seeking child care; Professional development training and technical assistance for child care providers; Consumer education to parents and the public; Increasing child care infrastructure; Increasing the quality of child care programs; and, Supporting Alaska's Early Learning System.

**Description of Services:** This grant provides funding to develop work experience opportunities in remote villages, increasing program capacity to support Alaska Temporary Assistance Program (ATAP) Work Services participants as they prepare and engage in work and work experience placements.

**Assessment of Need:** The Administration for Children and Families (ACF) sets standards for parents receiving Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) benefits for participating in work or community work experience activities and the hours of participation. **Description of Services:** Native Family Assistance Program (NFAP) grants are used to augment federal Tribal Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) funds and comprise a significant portion of Alaska's TANF Maintenance of Effort (MOE) requirement. The NFAP grants will be used by eligible grantees in accordance with state TANF regulations. NFAP grants are primarily used to pay cash benefits directly to TANF eligible families, assisting them in moving from reliance on welfare to self-sufficiency through employment, cash assistance, supportive services, diversion payments, and associated case management services.

**Assessment of Need:** Tribal organizations receive federal TANF funding based on a States 1994 caseload and expenditure data for Indian families residing in the service area of the eligible Tribal entity. The NFAP grants are needed to supplement the federal TANF funds and satisfy approximately 30 percent of Alaska's historic spending efforts on TANF.

**Service Delivery Area:** Service areas are defined by the boundaries of each of the eligible Alaska Native entity's responsible for the administration of a Native Family Assistance Program, and are included in their federally approved Tribal Family Assistance Plan.

### SNAP Employment and Training

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.27.005 Duties of the Department; AS 47.27.030 Family Self-Sufficiency Services.

**Description of Services:** Under the Supplemental Nutritional Assistance Program (SNAP) Employment and Training (E&T) grant, agencies already providing E&T services may be reimbursed a portion of their actual costs when serving SNAP recipients who are not currently receiving benefits under the Alaska Temporary Assistance Program (ATAP). The program divides E&T services into three components: Job Search, Education and Vocational Training. Services are designed to further advance the skill set and employability of the trainee. Supportive services such as transportation assistance, supplies, books and expenses directly related to participation may also be provided. It is anticipated that SNAP recipient participation in the E&T program will be voluntary; however, there is the possibility that participation may become mandatory in the future and will greatly increase grantee caseloads.

**Assessment of Need:** As authorized under the amended Federal Food and Nutrition Act of 2008, the State of Alaska seeks to create a robust employment & training network of services for interested SNAP recipients who wish to increase their financial well-being for themselves and their families by increasing skills, increasing education, obtaining certificate training related to in-demand occupations, and/or participating in job readiness and job search programs.

**Service Delivery Area:** This new program will be piloted in the Anchorage area for the first three years but may expand into other areas in the future.

### Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC)

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, USDA Regulations 7 CFR Part 246

**Description of Services:** The Women, Infants and Children (WIC) program provides nutrition assessment services, nutrition education, breastfeeding guidance and support, free supplemental foods that contain key nutrients often lacking in the diets of the target population, and referral for health and social services. WIC services are combined with pediatric and prenatal services wherever possible. A portion of funds are also issued under this grant procurement authorization to initiate upgrades to equipment, facilities or infrastructure, including piloting new technologies and other United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) priorities, enhancing nutrition education resources, and other projects to enhance and expand services.

**Assessment of Need:** The WIC Program currently serves approximately 21,000 women, infants and children through 13 grantees at 23 fixed clinic locations with 235 additional communities served on an itinerant basis. With declining federal revenues for the program, and the need to ensure continuing and more effective service delivery with those reduced resources, the WIC program has been implementing changes to help protect the integrity of services. In FY 14, the WIC Program proposed changes to the service infrastructure in order to achieve four primary goals: 1) Attain grantee administrative and service delivery cost efficiencies; 2) Increase grantee staff resources available for direct services; 3) Target underserved populations; and 4) Increase compliance with federal standards on WIC nutrition services.

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, 7 CFR 272.2(e) Supplemental Requirements

**Description of Services:** The Healthy, Hunger-Free Kids Act of 2010 (Public Law 111-296), section 241, established the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program - Education (SNAP-ED) as the Nutrition Education and Obesity Prevention Grant Program. Activities must be evidenced-based and delivered through individual or group-based strategies, comprehensive multi-level interventions, and/or community and public health approaches. SNAP-ED efforts may also address environmental and policy-level interventions. National, State, and local coordination and collaboration is strongly encouraged and recommended.

**Assessment of Need:** In an effort to expand activities, leverage limited funding by identifying communities with limited access to health or physical information, and reduce prevalence of obesity on low-income areas, SNAP-ED was incorporated into Family Nutrition Programs. A needs assessment was conducted to identify regions of the state with the highest need for SNAP-ED services, the nutrition concerns in those areas, and recommend best strategies of delivering the nutrition messages.

**Service Delivery Area:** Statewide; however, applicants proposing to serve one or more of the following priority areas identified below by the SNAP-ED needs assessment will receive a preference.

### Clinical Family Planning Services (Title X)

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, Title X grants are not authorized as part of the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act.

**Description of Services:** This program provides funding to qualified applicants to offer low-cost, confidential, clinical reproductive health and family planning services to low-income women and men residing on the lower Kenai Peninsula. Services must include, but are not limited to: comprehensive reproductive health exams, clinical breast examinations, Pap smear screening and pelvic examinations, pregnancy testing, counseling and screening for sexually transmitted diseases and counseling and provision of contraceptive methods. In addition to clinical services, the qualified applicant must offer client education and referral to other local agencies for all pregnancy options and for sterilizations and other clinical procedures and screening or diagnostic tests not performed on site. The broad range of services paid for with Title X monies strictly prohibits abortion as a method of family planning. As a recipient of federal Title X funding, the clinical services provider must follow Title X policies and procedures for determining eligibility and enrolling women and men for discounted services, as well as meeting the Title X Program requirements of a clinical services delivery site.

**Assessment of Need:** The Kenai Peninsula census area has among the highest number of unintended births in the state. Planned Parenthood of Alaska operates a Title X-funded clinic in Soldotna, located on the upper Kenai Peninsula, offering low-cost, high quality clinical family planning services to low income women and men residing in the surrounding communities. The Department seeks a family planning services provider to offer comparable services to low income women and men on the lower Kenai Peninsula and surrounding areas.

**Service Delivery Area:** The funds from this program target the lower Kenai Peninsula, which includes Homer and the surrounding communities.

### Community Health Centers - Senior Access Program

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs

**Description of Services:** The goal of the Community Health Centers - Senior Access Program (CHC-SAP) is to increase access and delivery of primary care to Alaska seniors (persons age 65 years and older) through Alaska's Community Health Centers (CHCs). Funding is to help alleviate strain on Community Health Centers resulting from medical homes for seniors who have been refused care by private practice physicians due to low Medicare reimbursement rates.

**Assessment of Need:** In this current and growing primary care crisis for seniors with Medicare as primary insurer, seniors are being refused care by physicians due to Medicare's low reimbursement rate. In some parts of Alaska, Community Health Centers are often the only providers available and/or willing to see Medicare patients. During the 2016-2017 grant years, 9,455 Medicare enrollees (approx. 11.3% of Alaska's Medicare enrollees) received services through the Senior Access Program provided by over 13 Community Health Centers throughout the state.

### HIV Care

### HIV/AIDS Prevention

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, Public Health Service Act, Section 201, 42 U.S.C. 241; Alaska HIV Prevention Plan, AS 44.29.020.

**Description of Services:** Services will impact HIV prevention and diagnosis along the HIV care continuum, including: 1) HIV prevention, 2) HIV testing, 3) linkage to medical care for persons newly diagnosed with HIV, and 4) retention in medical care for persons living with HIV. As this grant is fully funded by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), all program services and interventions must be allowable under the Federal HIV Prevention funding opportunity announcement, and are subject to change based on Federal requirements. Recommended interventions by the CDC may include activities such as promotion of bio-medical HIV prevention services, condom distribution, HIV testing, and prevention with positives. Services which impact HIV prevention and testing at the health systems level may also be implemented.

**Assessment of Need:** Using epidemiological data, the HIV/STD Program has identified populations at increased risk for acquiring HIV in Alaska, including men who have sex with men, injection drug users, and high-risk heterosexuals. These populations are outlined in the epidemiologic profile of Alaska's 2017-2021 Integrated HIV Prevention and Care Plan, and have been approved by the Alaska Integrated HIV Advisory Group. Grant services will target the priority populations identified by the HIV/STD Program, as well as other priority target populations that may be identified and required by the CDC.

**Description of Services:** Parent Navigation services provide support and assistance to families of children with cleft lip/palate, hearing loss or deafness, or autism and other co-occurring neurodevelopmental disorders. Services support families from the initial screening through diagnostic evaluation and assist with identifying treatment and payment options.

**Assessment of Need:** Parent Navigation links families with trained parents who have experienced having children with similar conditions. Families benefit from Parent Navigation support and experience improved outcomes for children and youth with special health care needs through facilitated linkage with community providers and resources.

**Service Delivery Area:** Services are available statewide through clinics held in Anchorage and Fairbanks for cleft lip/palate, and several communities around the state for autism screening. There are no formal clinics for hearing screening.

## Public Health

### Primary Prevention of Sexual Violence

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs

**Description of Services:** The grant will provide for the delivery of sexual violence primary prevention activities aligned with federal CDC Rape Prevention and Education Program. Sexual violence prevention interventions will use an evidence-based process for strategy selection and the use of a public health approach.

**Assessment of Need:** Based on US Department of Justice Federal Bureau of Investigation data in 2012 Alaska had the highest rate of forcible rape in the nation, at 79.7 reported offenses per 100,000 Alaskans. A 2010 survey conducted by the University of Alaska Anchorage Justice Center found that 37.1% of Alaskan women reported some level of sexual victimization in their lifetime. In the 2013 bi-annual Youth Risk Behavior Survey of Alaska's high school students, Alaska's traditional high school students reported 9.3% were forced to have unwanted sexual activity. These sources indicate a high level of need for primary prevention activities to prevent sexual assault in Alaska's youth.

### Public Health Emergency Preparedness

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 44.29.020; PHS 309(A) 317(K)(1)(2) 319; 42 USC 241(A); 42 USC 247d-3a

**Description of Services:** Program services will achieve statewide public health and medical preparedness goals through the maintenance and increase of disaster and public health emergency preparedness, response, and recovery capabilities. Services include participation with the Division in ongoing statewide risk assessment and gap analyses, and the development and implementation of target capabilities identified by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). Target capabilities for healthcare system preparedness and recovery include, though are not limited to: emergency operations coordination; information sharing; mass care; fatality management; volunteer management; responder safety and health; and medical materials management and distribution, including medical surge and dispensing of countermeasures.

**Assessment of Need:** Alaska's ability to effectively respond to large scale public health emergencies, natural disasters, and man-made hazards is imperative as the public health system plays a critical role in such emergencies. An effective, broadly developed and coordinated emergency response lessens the impact of such incidents and contributes significantly to community and individual resilience following such incidents.

**Service Delivery Area:** Service delivery is statewide for preparedness services to benefit all Alaskans.

### Public Health Nursing

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs

**Description of Services:** Public health nurses are expected to provide population and systems based health promotion and disease prevention services to communities and regions, and direct clinical preventive services to individuals and families. Services include prevention and control of infectious and non-infectious diseases through immunizations, screening, testing, treatment, contact investigation, education and outreach; public health emergency preparedness and response activities; outreach to families and children at medical and social risk; referral and linking of individuals and families with needed services; and direct provision of health services when they are otherwise unavailable.

**Assessment of Need:** Currently we do not have state-run public health centers in the proposed service delivery areas. The Municipality of Anchorage, North Slope Borough, and Maniilaq Association, are the only organized governing bodies vested with health powers that serve each of these geographical areas. Grants with these three governing bodies are deemed the most effective and appropriate means of providing area-wide public health nursing services. A disruption in the delivery of these services would place residents at increased risk of infectious disease and would reduce preventive health services available to high-risk/medically underserved women and young children.

**Service Delivery Area:** The Municipality of Anchorage proposed service delivery area includes the Municipality of Anchorage and the Girdwood, Eagle River, and Chugiak communities. The North Slope Borough proposed service delivery area includes the community of Barrow and the villages of Atkasuk, Kaktovik, Nuiqsut, Point Lay, and Wainwright. The Maniilaq Association proposed service delivery area includes populations of the City of Kotzebue, and the villages of Ambler, Buckland, Deering, Kiana, Kivalina, Kobuk, Noatak, Noorvik, Selawick, Point Hope, and Shungnak.

### Teen and Unintended Pregnancy Prevention

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs

**Description of Services:** This program implements non-marital pregnancy prevention projects designed to educate providers and young Alaskans about the prevention of teen and unintended-pregnancies using abstinence primary messages as appropriate. Grantees will work collaboratively with health care providers, health educators and Alaskans at risk of unintended pregnancies.

**Assessment of Need:** Both teen and unplanned pregnancy are closely linked to a host of critical social issues that Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) aims to address, such as poverty, lack of education, high levels of relationship conflict and family turmoil, father absence, single parenthood, and various negative social, health, and economic outcomes for children born as a result of such pregnancies.

Alaska Pregnancy Risk and Monitoring System (PRAMS) data from 2012-2014 indicates that of women under 20 years old, 71% of pregnancies resulting in a live birth were unintended, compared to 43% of women aged 20-24. Most notably, Alaska consistently ranks highest for Chlamydia rates in the US since 2000 (State of Alaska, Division of Public Health; Section of Epidemiology, 2017). Alaska also has high gonorrhea rates. In 2016, 15-19 year olds accounted for 9.63% or 140 cases per 100,000 persons. Alaska ranks the highest in rape incidence annually in the US (FBI Statistics, 2016). 59% of adult females had a lifetime prevalence of intimate partner or sexual violence (National Coalition Against Domestic Violence, 2015). Intimate partner violence can impact a young woman's reproductive and sexual health, increasing the risk for unintended pregnancies, abortions, miscarriage and HIV or STD infection (Silverman et al., 2001).

**Service Delivery Area:** Services will continue to be provided by two partner agencies, the Reproductive Health Clinic at the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS), Municipality of Anchorage (MOA) and The R.E.C. Room at Kachemak Bay Family Planning Clinic (KBFP) in Homer, working in regions of the state with high percentages of non-marital births.

## Public Health

### Title X Clinical Family Planning Services

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs,

Title X grants are not authorized as part of the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act.

**Description of Services:** Program services offer low-cost, confidential, clinical reproductive health and family planning services to low-income women and men. Services must include, but are not limited to: comprehensive reproductive health exams, clinical breast examinations, Pap smear screening and pelvic examinations, pregnancy testing, counseling and screening for sexually transmitted diseases and counseling and provision of contraceptive methods. In addition to clinical services, grantees must offer client education and referral to other local agencies for all pregnancy options and for sterilizations and other clinical procedures and screening or diagnostic tests not performed on site. The broad range of services paid for with Title X monies strictly prohibits abortion as a method of family planning. As a recipient of federal Title X funding, the grantee must follow Title X policies and procedures for determining eligibility and enrolling women and men for discounted services, as well as meeting the Title X Program requirements of a clinical services delivery site.

**Assessment of Need:** Historically, the Anchorage/Mat-Su, Southwest, and Northern economic regions of the state have experienced the highest teen and unintended pregnancy rates, and remain significantly higher than the overall state rate. In these regions, there are a variety of private and publicly-funded providers of clinical family planning services, however, very few offer the confidential, low cost, comprehensive quality family planning and related preventive health services required of a Title X site.

**Service Delivery Area:** Service delivery area includes the Anchorage/Mat-Su, Southwest, and Northern economic regions of the state.

**Description of Services:** Through recommendations in the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC) best practices for Comprehensive Tobacco Control Program the Tobacco Prevention and Control (TPC) Community Grant Program is intended to: prevent initiation of tobacco use among youth, eliminate exposure to secondhand smoke, promote tobacco cessation among youth and adults and identify and eliminate tobacco-related disparities. Each grantee will work to provide comprehensive services in their community or region and collaborate with other TPC funded agencies or partners.

**Assessment of Need:** Comprehensive Tobacco Prevention Cessation programs in communities across the state are a proven effective means to reduce the death, disability and economic burden caused by tobacco use.

**Service Delivery Area:** Program staff anticipates providing community or regional grants to organizations based on their ability to impact their communities in the four CDC recommended evidence based practices: prevent initiation of tobacco use among youth, eliminate exposure to secondhand smoke, promote tobacco cessation among youth and adults and identify and eliminate tobacco-related disparities.

### Youth Pregnancy and Violence Prevention

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs

**Description of Services:** This grant administers mini grants to youth groups in Alaska designed to strengthen and increase positive experiences that prevent teen pregnancies, promote healthy relationships, and empower young Alaskans to develop into healthy, respectful, caring, and responsible citizens.

**Assessment of Need:** Teen pregnancy is associated with several adverse outcomes affecting both mother and infant. Teen pregnancy is associated with several critical social issues including poverty and income, overall child well-being, education, child welfare and out-of-wedlock births. In addition, teens who have been victims of child abuse or intimate partner violence are more likely to have an unintended pregnancy and to engage in sexual risk behaviors. In Alaska in 2017, 7.3% of students in traditional high schools reported being physically hurt on purpose at least once by someone they were dating according to the Alaska Youth Risk Behavior Survey. The partner organization must choose grantees who work in regions that have a high incidence of early sexual onset, high rates of teen births or high rates of intimate partner violence as demonstrated by data and/or knowledge of community and population behaviors.

**Description of Services:** Adult Day Services (ADS) provide an organized program of services in a facility-based group setting, including supervision and a secure environment for individuals who experience Alzheimer's Disease and Related Disorders (ADRD), physical, emotional and/or other cognitive impairments. Services incorporate person-centered planning approaches in response to an evaluation of the person's functional health, social needs and interests. ADS programs are non-residential and occur during part of a day but less than 24 hours per day.

**Assessment of Need:** ADS provides supervised care during the day to eligible individuals at risk for institutionalization. Services provide therapeutic activities and supports programs that maintain or increase optimal mental and physical functioning. Additionally, services provide respite to caregivers to support continuing care at home, forestalling or avoiding the need to institutionalization. Expansion of Adult Day Services is needed to meet the needs of the increasing number of seniors with ADRD.

### Aging and Disability Resource Centers

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.24 Protection of Vulnerable Adults, AS 47.65 Service Programs for Older Alaskans and Other Adults, Federal Authorization: PL 101-508 codified at 42 USC 1395b-4, section 4360 of the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1990, 7AAC 127.030 (b), and 7AAC 127.190 (12).

**Description of Services:** ADRC serves as an unbiased resource for information and assistance related to long term services and supports to seniors, people with disabilities, and to their caregivers and families. Core functions include information, referral and assistance, options counseling, streamlined benefits screening, person-centered transition support, as well as outreach and training. Additionally, all individuals seeking Medicaid funded support through Senior and Disability Services (SDS) will be required to complete the Person Centered Intake process through the ADRC program to help streamline the process.

**Assessment of Need:** With a growing senior population and rising costs for long term support services, the need for easily accessible, unbiased information, as well as expertise concerning available options and supported decision making, is an increasingly essential service. As SDS streamlines the process of accessing Medicaid funded services, the ADRC's will play an integral role in completing the person centered intake form for each person seeking long term assistance. Beginning in FY2019, the ADRCs will serve as the entry point for all SDS Waiver services.

**Service Delivery Area:** ADRCs currently serve Anchorage, Kenai/Valdez/Cordova, Southeast Alaska, Bristol Bay/Kodiak, and the Matanuska-Susitna Borough. Additionally, in FY2019, the Fairbanks Northstar Borough will also be served by an ADRC.

**Description of Services:** This program provides outreach, transportation, and housing utilizing "host families" for students attending the Alaska State School for Deaf and Hard of Hearing (ASSDHH). Additionally, the Student Life Center (SLC) supports "host families" by providing training, assistance meeting licensing requirements, stipends, and respite. Services are provided 24 hours a day, seven days a week during the academic year.

**Assessment of Need:** Students from all over the state attend the Alaska State School for Deaf and Hard of Hearing and the SLC provides essential services to ensure students from rural areas are able to attend. The SLC provides transportation and housing for students who attend the ASSDHH whose families reside in rural areas outside of Anchorage. The SLC program identifies "host families" in Anchorage who will provide a home-like environment to students while they are attending ASSDHH. The ASSDHH determines a child's needs and must refer the child to the program in order for the child to become a member of the SLC family.

**Service Delivery Area:** The Student Life Center is located in Anchorage and serves students from all over Alaska.

**Description of Services:** Alzheimer's Disease and Related Disorders (ADRD) Education and Support provides statewide education and support services to people with Alzheimer's Disease and Related Disorders including Vascular Dementia, Parkinson's disease, Pick's disease, Huntington's disease, Lewy Bodies, HIV and alcohol related dementia and others. Services help families and caregivers to maintain the ADRD client at home, forestalling or preventing institutionalization. The scope of work includes education and dissemination of information about ADRD to the general public, healthcare professionals, professional caregivers, agencies and organizations to increase awareness of ADRD. Additionally, the program links caregivers and agencies with resources available in their area to continue caring for the individual with ADRD in their home and community.

**Assessment of Need:** People with dementia live an average of eight years and it is estimated that 7 out of 10 people with ADRD live at home. Alzheimer's afflicts 1 in 8 persons over 65 and nearly half of all people over 85, and it is estimated that by 2025 Alaska will have approximately 9000 individuals diagnosed with Alzheimer's Disease.

**Description of Services:** As required by AS 47.80.100, the Department must, within the limits of appropriation, implement a comprehensive system of services and facilities dispersed throughout the state. The services required under this statute are specialized and directed towards addressing habilitation and crises needs of individuals with developmental disabilities.

This program provides wrap-around support interventions for adults with disabilities who have a history of victimization and remain at risk. Among the services provided are assessment, psychosocial skills training, socio-sexual skills training, clinical case management, and case consultation. Personal safety and risk reduction strategies are designed to assist individuals to live safely in their homes and communities. Behavioral risk management services are available for individuals with a history of inappropriate sexual behavior or victimization. Staff provide conference presentations, workshops, technical assistance and support, and are published writers in the area of disability and abuse.

**Assessment of Need:** Services are for individuals with developmental disabilities who display high risk or inappropriate behaviors and are at risk of institutionalization in corrections facilities, as well as individuals who, because of their disability, are more vulnerable to abuse. Training or support provided by this program must be accessible to direct service staff, school paraprofessionals, family members of people with disabilities, and other interested students in their home communities.

**Description of Services:** Centers for Independent Living are community based, cross-disability, non-profit organizations that are designed and operated by people with disabilities. Independent Living Centers provide five core services: 1) Individual systems advocacy, 2) Information and Referral, 3) Peer counseling (including cross-disability peer counseling), 4) Independent living skills training, and 5) Transition Services.

**Assessment of Need:** Centers for Independent Living provide expertise and assist individuals to live independently through the use of assistive technology, benefits counseling, job skill training, transportation, home and work accommodations, and other modifications. Alaska's four CILs helped 3211 individuals in FY2017.

**Description of Services:** This program provides services to enhance the quality of life for consumers impacted by developmental disabilities. Services address the needs of individuals with developmental disabilities that assist them in living as independently as possible in their homes and communities. Services are provided by community providers who have expertise and training in developmental disabilities and may include Case Management, Supportive Employment, Day Habilitation, Respite, Supportive Living or other services as determined in the recipient's plan of care.

**Assessment of Need:** Under AS 47.80.100, the department provides people with developmental disabilities specialized services directed toward their social, personal, physical, or economical habilitation. Applying a national prevalence factor (1.8%) for the occurrence of developmental disability to the Alaskan population, it is estimated that there are 12,000 to 13,000 Alaskans with developmental disabilities. Only about 2,837 people receive services funded by a Community Developmental Disabilities grant or Medicaid waiver. Currently, there is a registration of 565 people awaiting selection for a Medicaid waiver or who do not meet the criteria for Medicaid waivers and are in need of various Community Developmental Disabilities direct services.

### Deaf Navigator

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.05.010 (17) Duties of the Department and AS 47.65 Service Programs for Older Alaskans and Other Adults

**Description of Services:** The Deaf Navigator Program will provide a range of resources and services designed to improve long-term employment and housing outcomes to Alaskans who are deaf or hard of hearing. The program will provide assistance navigating and accessing available resources, coordinate siloed service systems for individuals with multiple disabilities, provide training to employers and service providers on deaf culture values, coordinate with the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation to maximize employment supports, and assist individuals who are deaf and hard of hearing in accessing and maintaining appropriate and affordable housing. The Deaf Navigator Program will coordinate with the Denali Deaf Council and other community programs to promote independence and advocate for the needs of individuals who are deaf and hard of hearing throughout the state.

**Assessment of Need:** Rates of homelessness, unemployment and incarceration of individuals who are deaf and hard of hearing have increased over the last 6 years due to the elimination of the Anchorage Deaf and Hard of Hearing Center. Deaf individuals report increasing difficulty accessing available resources, finding and maintaining employment and housing due to lack of understanding of complex systems and communication barriers. Assistance with communication and coordinated service system supports can help ensure positive long term outcomes.

**Description of Services:** The purpose of this grant program is to provide early intervention services to families of infants and toddlers (birth to third birthday) with disabilities and/or developmental delays to ensure improved outcomes and the development of natural supports for children and their families. Service delivery performance and program standards comply with the requirements of Part C the Federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA). The Early Intervention/Infant Learning Program (EI/ILP) grantees will provide family-centered, home-based services that include developmental evaluation/assessments, service coordination, development of Individualized Family Service Plans (IFSP), and educational and/or therapeutic services as determined by the EI/ILP team.

**Assessment of Need:** IDEA requires that comprehensive early intervention services be available to eligible infants and toddlers and their families in all areas of the state. Approximately 2300 infants and toddlers are referred to the Infant Learning Program for services annually. The Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act (CAPTA), reauthorized with the enactment of the Keeping Children and Families Safe Act of 2010 (P.L. 111-320), requires referral of infants and toddlers to Part C early intervention who are: (a) The subject of a substantiated case of child abuse or neglect; or (b) Identified as directly affected by illegal substance abuse or withdrawal symptoms resulting from prenatal drug exposure.

Alaska has an increasing population of adults aged 60 and older. Most older adults have at least one chronic condition and many have multiple conditions. Adults over age 60 are increasingly likely to fall, which can result in loss of independence and entry into institutional care. Prevention activities, including self-management of chronic conditions, falls prevention, physical activity, and medication education have been proven to improve emotional and physical health, wellbeing, and to sustain the ability to carry out activities of daily living so the person is able to remain at home.

**Description of Services:** Medicare Counseling and Outreach (MCO) grants provide coordination of Medicare outreach, counseling, referral, and data-entry activities consistent with the State Health Insurance Assistance Program and Senior Medicare Patrol grants. As an extension of the Medicare Information Office, they provide one-on-one Medicare counseling and public media outreach to seniors and people with disabilities. Counseling and referral is performed both on-site and over the phone, and outreach is provided off-site at community locations and events.

**Assessment of Need:** Availability of Medicare counseling and information for beneficiaries is essential for accessing necessary health care and medications. Demand for Medicaid Counseling and Outreach has increased with the expanding senior population in Alaska. Grants under this program increase the capacity of the Division of Senior and Disabilities Medicare Information Office to the growing population.

**Service Delivery Area:** Funding will leverage existing certified Medicare counselors to support and assist the State Medicare Information Office in providing information to the largest populated areas of the State, and also to beneficiaries statewide.

### National Family Caregiver Support

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.05.010 (16) and (17) Duties of the Department; AS 47.65 Service Programs for Older Alaskans and Other Adults; Title III of the Older Americans Act.

**Description of Services:** The NFCS program provides support to unpaid caregivers of individuals age 60 or older, persons with Alzheimer's disease or related disorders (regardless of age); and grandparents (age 55 or older) raising children no older than age 18. Caregiver support services include information about available services, assistance to caregivers in gaining access to the services, individual counseling, organization of support groups and caregiving training, and respite care and supplemental services on a limited basis.

**Assessment of Need:** Family Caregivers provide over \$450 billion per year in unpaid long term care services. The value of family caregivers will likely continue to be the largest source of long-term care services in the US as the aging population 65+ increases. Providing support to family caregivers may increase the length of time caregivers are able to care for their loved one at home.

The Nutrition Services Incentive Program (NSIP) provider agreement is reimbursement per meal in addition to the grant to enhance the nutrient quality of the meals served under Title III.

The NTS Title III grant and NSIP funds are combined for a Senior Meals through Schools Provider Agreement that reimburses for eligible senior meals served by Lower Kuskokwim School District. This has been determined to be a successful strategy for meeting the nutritional needs of rural elders.

**Assessment of Need:** Applicants for grants identify the target population as individuals with the greatest economic and social need with particular attention to older persons whose income falls below the guideline, live alone, are minorities, live in rural areas, and are frail as defined in Title III.

### Protection and Advocacy

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, Public Law 106-402 Americans with Disabilities Act; AS 47.80 Persons with Disabilities

**Description of Services:** The Protection and Advocacy Program provides people with developmental disabilities, and their families, training and assistance in methods to resolve grievances they may have with providers of community developmental disability services. Services funded by the program range from Information and Referral, Negotiation and Mediation, various Interventions in line with Administrative Recourse and, as a last resort, Legal Consultation and Remedies. The program exists to assist eligible individuals, sometimes through their families and guardians, to engage in their own advocacy.

In collaboration with the Division of Senior and Disabilities Services, this grant has been used to emphasize training to recipients in such areas as Special Education, Social Security and the Americans with Disabilities Act.

**Assessment of Need:** Under the Federal Developmental Disabilities Act, the State must have a system of protection and advocacy that has the capacity to provide administrative and legal remedies to civil rights concerns for people with developmental disabilities. Further, the agency must be independent of any service-providing agencies.

### Senior In-Home Services

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.05.010 (17) Duties of the Department; AS 47.65 Service Programs for Older Alaskans and Other Adults.

**Description of Services:** Senior In-Home (SIH) Services provide case management and in-home services to eligible seniors who do not qualify for Medicaid Waiver services and need assistance with activities of daily living. The goal of the program is to support Alaskan seniors so that they may remain in their homes and communities for as long as possible thereby forestalling or eliminating more costly institutional care. Services include Case Management, Chore, Respite, Extended Respite and Supplemental Services (up to \$500 per household per year for items or services that support the "low-income" senior in avoiding a crisis that would jeopardize their ability to remain independently in their home).

**Assessment of Need:** These services offer a safety net for low income seniors who do not meet the level of care for the Home and Community Based Medicaid Waiver program, especially those with Alzheimer's Disease and related disorders. By providing case management and in-home assistance, the SIH program is able to extend the time an individual can live independently in their own home and communities and reduce the need for costly institutional care. This continues to be very important as Alaska's senior population is now the fastest growing per capita in the U.S.

### Senior Residential Services

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.65 Service Programs for Older Alaskans; AS 47.33 and 7 AAC 75 Assisted Living Homes

**Description of Services:** This program provides supported residential living to frail elders who do not have access to Pioneer Homes or other Long Term Care facilities in their community or region. Residents receive individual support in a residential setting for assistance with Activities of Daily Living; personal care, and Instrumental Activities of Daily Living; and meal preparation. Services also provide support to elders living in the community or region who may stay short term until their overall health improves and they can return home.

**Assessment of Need:** These services are needed for seniors 60 and over who are unable to live alone but who can maintain themselves in a supervised setting with minimal assistance. This allows frail elders in rural areas to continue living in or near their home communities and avoid the need to leave their families, culture and familiar surroundings for institutionalization in large urban settings.

### Traumatic and Acquired Brain Injury

**Granting Authority:** 7AAC 78 - Grant Programs, AS 47.80.500 Statewide Traumatic or Acquired Brain Injury Program.

**Description of Services:** The Traumatic or Acquired Brain Injury (TABI) Grant Program includes Case Management and Mini-Grant services. Case management supports individuals living with brain injury to utilize a comprehensive array of services including medical, rehabilitative, social, educational, vocational, in-home, and other needed services to improve quality of life and maintain independence. TABI Mini-Grants are intended to quickly respond to the needs of individuals to access services not covered by Medicaid, including medical, dental, behavioral training, and to purchase adaptive equipment and other items to implement compensatory strategies for cognitive disabilities.

**Assessment of Need:** The DHSS Trauma Registry reports that approximately 2,500 new traumatic brain injury survivors, 640 whom are seriously injured, join an estimated 10,000 to 12,000 Alaskans currently living with brain injury every year. Most people with TABI leaving acute care settings are discharged to home, where they piece together the limited supports available. Individuals who have experienced a brain injury have difficulty gaining access to health care providers who are trained in helping people with TABI. Case Management and Mini-Grant services provide a direct link between individuals with TABI and professionals and paraprofessionals who provide assistance so they can maintain independence in their homes and communities.



## About the Cover

Mary Joyce was a pioneer, southeast Alaska entrepreneur, and adventurer. During the 1930s, she owned and operated a remote wilderness lodge (Taku Lodge), became the first woman radio operator in the Territory of Alaska, made a thousand-mile sled dog trip from Juneau to Fairbanks, and was a hunting guide, pilot, flight attendant, nurse, and candidate for Alaska Territorial Representative. She inspired news and magazine articles, poems, plays, books, movies, art, and songs.

In December 1935 Joyce embarked with five dogs on an overland trek to represent Juneau at the Fairbanks Winter Carnival. She hired Native guides or traveled alone on her three-month, 1,000 mile trip. National media covered her adventure, noting the great distance, bitter  $-60^{\circ}$  F temperatures, primitive trails, and lack of communication, causing the American public to fear for her safety. Joyce flew the last leg to Fairbanks on March 26, 1936, where the mayor of Fairbanks awarded her a Silver Cup and the rare "Honorary Member" title from the Pioneers of Alaska. She completed her dog-mushing trip after the festival. "I wanted to see the country and experience some of the things the old-timers did," she told reporters. "I just wanted to see if I could do it."

Because of her knowledge of the remote country, Joyce hauled radio equipment by dog team for the Navy as it built defenses during World War II, was a consultant for construction of the Alaska-Canada Highway, taught survival skills to troops, and helped develop a new air route from New York to Fairbanks. In an Associated Press article, "Alaska Woman Could Give Soldiers Lessons in Defense," she is quoted: "It's nothing . . . Most Alaska women can take care of themselves." Explorer Norman Dawn chose Joyce to co-star as Taku Mary in a film, *Orphans of the North* (1940), shot in the Taku River region. Another film, *The Flying Saucer* (1950), is loosely based on the lives of Joyce and Hack Smith.

One of the first female pilots in Juneau, Joyce ended her piloting days with wounded pride after she collided with fishing gear on Gastineau Channel. A certified nurse, she spent two years as a flight attendant for Pacific Alaska Airways, a subsidiary of Pan American Airways, traveling the Alaska-Seattle-Montana routes. In the 1940s, Joyce sold her lodge and moved to Juneau where she was a nurse at St. Ann's Hospital and where she later purchased the Top Hat and Lucky Lady saloons. She led the statehood parade in Juneau and cut the ribbon for the first Iditarod trail race in 1973.
