Alaska spans a huge geographical area with a relatively small population. This is unique and requires a management system tailored to meet the needs of Alaskans. The Governor's Council on Disabilities & Special Education was created to meet Alaska's diverse needs. The Council uses planning, capacity building, systems change, and advocacy to create change for people with disabilities. Consistent with our State Plan we work towards systems change in areas including housing, employment, early intervention, special education, lifelong learning, independent living and inclusion in the community.

The Council provides a constructive process that connects the public with policymakers, to ensure the thoughtful development of an efficient and seamless service delivery system that meets the needs of individuals with disabilities across the life span. It is composed of 28 members appointed by the Governor. Appointments are made on a revolving basis by an application process. It serves a variety of federal and state roles, combining the expertise and experience of many stakeholders throughout the state into one unique Council:

State Council on Development Disabilities

Under the Developmental Disabilities Assistance and Bill of Rights Act, the Council serves as the State Council on Developmental Disabilities; in Alaska the Council is also responsible for interdepartmental planning and coordination of services to persons with severe disabilities. The Council delegates the day-to-day work to the Developmental Disabilities Committee (DD).

Interagency Coordinating Council (ICC) for Infants and Toddlers with Disabilities

Under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), the Council serves as the Interagency Coordinating Council for Infants and Toddlers with Disabilities, which advises and assists Alaska's statewide Early Intervention/Infant Learning Program (EI/ILP). The day-to-day functions of the ICC are delegated to the Early Intervention Committee (EIC).

Special Education Advisory Panel (SEAP)

Under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, the Council also serves as Alaska's Special Education Advisory Panel which advises and assists Alaska's statewide Special Education program administered through the Department of Education & Early Development. The day-to-day functions of the SEAP are delegated to the Education Committee (EC).

Governing Body of the Special Education Service Agency (SESA)

Members of the Council act as the governing board for the Special Education Services Agency, which supports the effective education of students with low incidence disabilities throughout Alaska. For more information you can visit their website at: <http://www.sesa.org/>

The Alaska Mental Health Trust Authority

The Council reports on the status and needs of individuals with developmental disabilities and their families and makes recommendations for funding on their behalf. For more information you can visit their website at: <http://www.mhtrust.org/>

Purpose

The Special Education Advisory Panel is established (IDEA Regulations, 34 C.F.R. Part 300.652) in order to advise and assist the State with respect to special education and related services for children with disabilities, including advising the State on the education of eligible youth with disabilities who have been convicted as adults and incarcerated in adult prisons.

Meetings

The Council held three face-to face meetings in the 2003-04 academic year.

October 8-10, 2003- Talkeetna Alaskan Lodge, Talkeetna

January 20-23, 2004 – Centennial Hall, Juneau

May 7-9, 2004– Alyeska Prince Hotel, Girdwood

In addition, much of the work of the Special Education Advisory Panel is accomplished through the Education Committee, a standing committee of the Council that meets by teleconference on the second Tuesday of each month. Agendas and attachments are sent a week in advance. Approved minutes are posted on the Council's website <http://www.hss.state.ak.us/gcdse/>. During each Council meeting, a community forum is held so that local people can provide input on issues related to Early Intervention/Infant Learning Program, special education, disabilities or related concerns. In this school year, an additional public forum was held in Fairbanks, and people shared their experiences at the (Special Education Law and Advocacy) Training held in Juneau and Anchorage in April 2004.

Department of Education and Early Development reports & requests

A positive collaboration continued throughout this academic year between the Department of EED staff specializing in Special Education and the Council. All the staff in the Special Education Unit are involved in at least one way with Council activities. Example: The Section 619 (Preschool) Coordinator serves on the Council's Early Intervention Committee. The State Special Education Director is appointed by the Governor to be on the Council and attends the Education Committee meetings as time allows.



As of 10/24/03 there were 17,998 students identified as eligible for Special Education services in Alaska's 55 districts (including Alyeska Central School of Correspondence). In addition statewide correspondence schools service hundreds of children with disabilities.

The Council notes that 70 percent of all students in Alaska who are receiving Special Education (12,603) are receiving services for a learning or speech/language issue.



The Education Committee completed much of its work plan. A few new resources were developed for the public to access including the AKSPED list serve, which 350+ people now subscribe to. The Welcome to Special Education in Alaska booklet was printed for distribution, and is also a new chapter in the State Department of EED's Special Education Handbook. More than sixty people receive a monthly Learning Opportunities for Alaskans email highlighting training opportunities around the state. Pam and Pete Wright conducted their two day "boot camp" drawing 100 people together in Juneau and 230 in Anchorage.

- ◇ Developed a new section for the State's Special Education Handbook called "Welcome to Special Education in Alaska" and published it as stand-alone brochure

- ◇ Developed linguistically appropriate materials for a presentation in Kodiak in Spanish and Tagalog.

- ◇ Presented on Secondary Transition at the Alaska Statewide Special Education Conference
- ◇ Moved forward on the SIG-based Web Development of a central parent training and information calendar and website

- ◇ Emailed out "Learning Opportunities" email monthly to help people access training and information


