

## Why assign your ticket to an Employment Network?

You can make more money working than you will on SSA benefits.

Working provides much more than a paycheck. It provides opportunities to learn new skills and meet new people, provides a sense of accomplishment, boosts self esteem, opens up advancement opportunities and generates potential health and retirement benefits.

Once your ticket is assigned you receive protection from Continuing Medical Reviews while you are actively working on your individual work plan.

If your wages exceed Social Security income limits, you can maintain your medical benefits through the Alaska Working Disabled Medicaid Buy-In program.

Utilize an expert at the job center to help you chart your path to achieve your employment goals. Proper planning is a wonderful thing.

# Getting your ticket to work!


## What is the Ticket to Work program?

The Ticket to Work program provides most people receiving Social Security benefits more choices for receiving employment services.

Under this program, the Social Security Administration issues tickets to eligible beneficiaries who, in turn, may choose to assign the ticket to an Employment Network to obtain employment services.

Our goal is to provide you with the assistance you need to return to work that is within your areas of interest and meets your individual conditions of employment.


This may include a variety of the services or referrals to appropriate agencies such as vocational rehabilitation or other community service providers.




- Job accommodation instruction and assistance
- Follow-up supports including general employment guidance, job retention services and ongoing Social Security Disability benefits advisement
- Possible on-the-job training or skills training utilizing funding through the Workforce Investment Act, based on eligibility
- Referrals to additional services and supports

This ticket is issued to you by the Social Security Administration under the Ticket to Work and Self-Sufficiency Program. If you want help in returning to work or going to work for the first time, you may offer this ticket to an Employment Network of your choosing or take it to your State vocational rehabilitation agency for services. If you choose an Employment Network and it agrees to take your ticket, or if you choose your State agency and you qualify for services, those providers can offer you services to help you go to work.

An Employment Network provides the services at no cost to you. The Social Security Administration will pay the Employment Network if you assign your ticket to it, and the Employment Network helps you go to work and complies with other requirements of the Program. An Employment Network serving under the Program has agreed to abide by the rules and regulations of the Program under the terms of its agreement with the Social Security Administration for providing services under the Program. Your State agency can tell you about its rules for getting services.
